






















Conclusions

- All the Greek family function subsystems seem to include kins from both the nuclear and the extended family structure.
- Mother seems to have an exceptional role within kin subsystems of the nuclear and the extended Greek family structures through her roles and the close emotional contact she maintains with both kin subsystems.
- Grandparents' emotional contact with nuclear family members seems to be higher in comparison with other relatives, while their roles within family interdependencies seem to be of decisive importance, especially for grandmother.


Conclusions (cntd.)

In general, the psychological variables we studied seem to represent a traditional orientation of the Greek family function, through the retainment of religious tradition, family cohesion and a network of emotional support among family members.


These functions, along with the less traditional patterns of family structure in geographic space and modes of contact, compose for the Greek family a combination of more traditional elements of function and less traditional elements of structure, within an urban setting.





